## MAIN OFFICE

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### Community Based Victim Services

Provides justice related services to assist adult, female, male, and child victims of violence in Relationships; adult sexual assault; child physical/ sexual assault/abuse; criminal harassment; child witnesses and other forms of family violence.

Service recipients will include victims of these crimes who may choose not to be involved with the criminal justice system.

### Homeless Outreach Program

Funded by BC Housing and the Gaming Policy and Enforcement Branch, provides support and advocacy to homeless individuals in Williams Lake and 100 Mile House areas. Outreach Workers facilitate access to income assistance benefits, accommodations and other essential supports.

### Multiculturalism Program

To build inclusive community and reduce racism; we strive to include all demographics, school children to elders, as well as outlying communities. CMHA CCB continues to build on the successes of the previous and existing Multicultural programs as well as create and develop new and compelling projects.

### Advocacy Outreach Support

To provide community-based support and advocacy services to individuals who have been recently housed after being homeless or are at serious risk of being homeless. These individuals may be experiencing significant mental health issues and will have serious barriers to seeking or acquiring income, health and housing supports or services on their own.

## JUBILEE PLACE

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Jubilee Place has 33 supportive housing units for persons who are homeless or at-risk -of- homelessness. The vision for Jubilee Place is a supportive community that improves the lives of homeless persons, or those at risk of homelessness, by providing support services, including housing, life skills training, rehabilitative social and recreational opportunities, and access to job skills training and educational upgrading. ### Subsidized Housing

This program administers subsidized housing for consumers in Williams Lake and area. Funding is provided by the Interior Health Authority through BC Housing. The purpose of this program is to help individuals with mental illness to move out of substandard housing into more appropriate accommodations.

## Employment Program of BC

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Person's with Disability Program:

Funded by the Ministry of Housing & Social Development, sub-contracted through **Williams Lake Employment**, this program provides employment counselling and support for individuals with permanent mental and/or physical disabilities that create barriers to employment (including volunteering and self-employment). Services are provided in Quesnel, 100 Mile House, Williams Lake and surrounding areas. Services include planning, training sponsorship, employment services, placements and ongoing support.

## JUBILEE HOUSE

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This seven bed residential care facility has cooperative living arrangements located within walking distance to recreational facilities and downtown. The daily rehabilitation program offers a warm, supportive and informal atmosphere, where teaching skills and balance of social and recreational activities are offered.
